4-H members note: You may only exhibit in the class for which you are enrolled. The corresponding classes are as follows:

Child Development 1 = Class A, Growing on My Own
Child Development 2 = Class B, Growing with Others
Child Development 3 = Class C, Growing in Communities

Regulations:

1. A total of seven entries per exhibitor is allowed.
2. Members must be present for an individual conference with the judge. Exhibitors not present will have their ribbon placings lowered and lose premium money.
3. Safety of children using the exhibits should be a consideration in making all the exhibits.

CLASS A. Growing on My Own

- 1) Scrapbook about yourself, chronological order preferred.
- 2) Growth chart or wall hanging representing your development such as first words, foods, my first step, my name, when I first dressed myself, my first tooth, etc.
- 3) Poster on child safety.
- 4) Display of the safety hazards in your home and how you dealt with them.
- 5) Choke-tube tester displayed with the purpose explained and a selection of safe and unsafe items.
- 6) Story masks of characters from a story. Include Book.
- 7) Display of early morning time clock and personal morning routine emphasizing time management.
- 8) Display of hats depicting some of the roles that you play.
- 9) Poster of fire escape routes from rooms of your house with outside meeting place noted.
- 10) Other project work not listed.

CLASS B. Growing with Others

- 1) A personal self-care plan for when you're home alone.
- 2) A group of three pictures showing unsafe conditions and how you dealt with them.
- 3) Age-appropriate toy chart.
- 4) Family tree or mobile.
- 5) Family rules worksheet.
- 6) Baby's toy box. Also write 3 situations for a babysitter to read to children to inspire them to play.
- 7) Stuffed toy made by exhibitor for child age 3 and younger, kits allowed.
- 8) Active play toy made by exhibitor for child age 3 or younger (no stuffed toys)
- 9) Poster on babysitting responsibilities
- 10) Babysitting kit - collection of articles or toys that would be helpful to a babysitter and an explanation of how it would be used (at least two items in kit should be made by exhibitor).
- 11) Art/craft item made by a toddler under your direction. Include written description of the learning goals you had for the child and what both of you learned.
- 12) Dress-up kit for children. Include an explanation of what children can learn by using it.
- 13) First Aid kit. Specify whether for a family or baby sitter. Include a list of contents and emergency phone numbers.
- 14) Educational game made by exhibitor for a child (children). Include rules and ages for the players.
- 15) Other project work not listed

CLASS C. Growing in Communities

- 1) Child development career watch game
- 2) Child development observation record sheet and explanation of physical, social, intellectual and emotional stages of development
- 3) Evaluation of TV programs for kids
- 4) Accessibility checklist or report
- 5) Display on the diversity of families in your community
- 6) Intergenerational community service project
- 7) Poster or display on the roles and responsibilities of parenthood
- 8) Puppet(s) and script for toddlers about making a decision, solving a problem, being safe or making friends
- 9) Book made for a child. Explain child's age range and learning goals.

- 10) Active toy made by exhibitor for a child. Explain child's age range and learning goals.
- 11) Non-active toy made by exhibitor for a child. Explain child's age range and learning goals.
- 12) Room accessory made by exhibitor for a child (i.e. wall hanging, mobile, pj keeper, etc.).
- 13) Travel kit for children including at least two items made by exhibitor.

Regulations:

1. The Communication Arts Festival (Classes A-K) will be held **April 29, 2018**, 1:00 p.m. at the 4-H office, 5201 Fen Oak. Trophy winners at the Communication Arts Festival must give their presentation at the Dane County Fair. These presentations will be given on the youth stage in Exhibition Hall A at 12:30 p.m. on Sunday, July 22.
2. Only classes L - T will be judged at the Fair. Classes A - K are offered as part of the Communication Arts Festival.
3. ****NEW THIS YEAR** Classes L - T, all lots will be judged individual conference, with a maximum of four exhibits being judged in one sitting.**
4. Any performers interested in being nominated to perform at Wisconsin State Fair must perform at the **Performers' Festival on April 15 at 1:00 p.m.** Oakwood Village University Woods Theater - 6205 Mineral Point Road, Madison. Youth must register for this event at <https://dc4hmusicdrama.wordpress.com>. At the Performers' Festival, one judge will make the final decision about which groups and/or individuals will be nominated to represent Dane County at the Wisconsin State Fair.
5. All essays, poems, stories and plays must have a **cover page** with the title and publication date. The name of the author is optional. A **brief summary** of the piece must be included if it is longer than two pages. It is recommended that the piece be in a protected cover or simple binding.
6. **Beginner** - 1st year, very little experience
Intermediate - 2nd & 3rd year, somewhat experienced
Advanced - 4th year and beyond, very experienced
7. Exhibitors should consider retaining copies of their work. The fair is not responsible for lost or damaged projects.

CLASS R. Music

Regulations:

1. No recordings of any kind will be allowed for entry.
2. Work may need to be hung with staples for display so a small tab to allow for this may be added by the exhibitor.
3. Exhibitors may submit copies of their work.
